





Our Tzevet In Israel Shane Safran

During the Seder we talk about the splitting of the sea, but when the Torah explains what happened, one passuk says the water split and Bnei Yisrael walked in dry land and the other passuk says that Bnei Yisrael walked on dry land and the water split. Why does the Torah flip the order in these 2 psukim?





The second group represents the passuk in which they crossed on dry land because the sea had split, they waited for the sea to split because they were lacking in Emunah.

The second group didn't get to the same Kedusha as the first group as they experienced the miracle after it had happened and not during the miracle itself.

I wish you all a chag sameach and may we learn from the splitting of the sea that when things get rough (even during the MH canoe trip) to have Emunah in Hashem because He controls the world and once we accept that all we need to do is pray, and BH Hashem answers our prayers and helps us in our time of need.
